President's Message

The following thought-provoking article is taken from Frank Deaver's Peace Editorials and is titled - 'World Understanding Starts at Home'. What does this Editorial say to us in the Rotary Club of Temora, during the third week of 'World Understanding' month?

"Our world is full of minorities. There are racial and ethnic minorities, there are religious minorities, there are political minorities, and many more. Rotarians also constitute a minority. Of the more than six billion people in the world, our number is only a little more than 1.2 million. What makes Rotarians different is that we are a distinctly privileged minority. Most Rotarians are among the one percent of people in the world who have a college education or who own a computer. In our comfortable homes, we are far richer than the 80 percent who live in substandard housing. With food enough to eat, we are healthier than the 50 percent who suffer from malnutrition. With the ability to read and write, we are more employable than the 70 percent who are illiterate. We are all too often the victims of a lack of understanding, or perhaps more accurately, of misunderstanding. We give to the Rotary Foundation, but we are only minimally aware of how our contributions are spent. We speak of Rotary's humanitarian programs, but we know too little about the plight of the recipients. The life of a Rotarian is in many ways too comfortable. Too few of us have had opportunity to personally witness the poverty and misery of the world's majority. Perhaps we have not even been exposed to the homeless, the illiterate, the oppressed, within our own communities. Perhaps our daily commute from comfortable home to comfortable office fails to take us through "that part of town." In truth, we need not look to distant lands to find the minority among us, the unfortunate ones who lack even the basic necessities of life. They are virtually on our doorsteps, and the fact that they so often remain invisible is as much our fault as theirs. This month, dedicated to World Understanding, offers to Rotarians a challenge to introduce one minority (ours) to other minorities (those who are in need). What we may come to understand is that there is more opportunity for service in our own communities than we realized. ..."

Rotarians ... in every community throughout the Rotary world, could embrace the philosophy of Stephen Grellet, French-American advocate for reforms in hospital and prison conditions:

"I expect to pass through this world but once. Any good things, therefore, that I can do, or any kindness that I can show a fellow being, let me do it now. Let me not defer or neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again."

World understanding is a noble and worthy Rotary goal, but it does not begin on the other side of the world. It begins where we are. It begins at our very doorstep."

World water Day – 22 March

International World Water Day is held annually on 22 March as a means of focusing attention on the importance of freshwater and advocating for the sustainable management of freshwater resources.

An international day to celebrate freshwater was recommended at the 1992 United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED). The United Nations General Assembly responded by designating 22 March 1993 as the first World Water Day.

Each year, World Water Day highlights a specific aspect of freshwater. On this page, we present a brief overview of the different themes that have been the focus of World Water Day celebrations of World Water Day celebrations.

This is the first time in human history that **most of the world's population live in cities: 3.3 billion people** ...and the urban landscape continues to grow.

38% of the growth is represented by expanding **slums**, while the city populations are increasing faster than city infrastructure can adapt.

The objective of World Water Day 2011 is to focus international attention on the impact of rapid urban population growth, industrialization and uncertainties caused by climate change, conflicts and natural disasters on urban water systems.

This year theme, *Water for cities: responding to the urban challenge*, aims to spotlight and encourage governments, organizations, communities, and individuals to actively engage in addressing the defy of urban water management

Treasurer (Keith Anderson):

Dinner fees collected \$368, expenses \$345.

Guest speaker Les Barrass (a charter member of Rotaract at Lake Cargelligo and again at Condobolin said there are now 16 Chaplains from all churches in NSWS servicing the area of mental health. He covers 100,000 kilometres each year in his caring activities. He spoke of the court chaplains, the juvenile justice chaplains, the street ministry and said he has a focus on suicide and suicide prevention. It can be very hard to identify people at risk, when people have decided there is noone who can help them and there is nowhere they can turn. It is hard for them to remember when everything was good. Their mood is often upbeat and after a suicide everyone says why did this happen. He advised that you should never

lend a firearm to anyone – no matter what the reason. He said one man had borrowed a rifle to go rabbit shooting and used it on himself. Actually someone who is considering taken their life is actually crying out for help. But they will hide it well. But if you suspect someone is not themself, you can ask if they are contemplating suicide. As you will get a direct response from them and open the doors to help them. If you ask you could save a life. If there is a big emotional or spiritual break down you can also ask them if they are contemplating suicide. Then get them to where they can be protected – like a hospital or a police station,. Les said there were 2,000 deaths a year from suicide – more than the road toll.

World Water Day



On 22 March, World Water Day, Rotary clubs and districts honor their commitment to promoting sustainable access to fresh water worldwide. Each year, World Water Day focuses on a different water issue. This year's theme is "Water for Cities: Responding to the Urban Challenge." Rotarians are in a unique position to advocate for clean water locally as well as globally. Rotary clubs in every part of the world engage in water projects and are looking for partners. Many resources are available to guide

your club or district in an effective, sustainable water project:

- The UN-Water website provides more information about World Water Day and its global events.
- The UN-HABITAT Water and Sanitation Program works to reduce the number of people without access to safe drinking water by half by 2015.
- The World Health Organization focuses on a variety of water-quality, sanitation, and hygiene interventions.

UNESCO organizes educational events and conferences dedicated to water issues.

Celebrate World Malaria Day

If your club is interested in fighting disease, consider celebrating World Malaria Day on 25 April by getting involved in a malaria prevention project. Malaria is a potentially fatal yet preventable disease that annually kills more than one million people and infects over 500 million. It is commonly transmitted by mosquitoes, but mosquito nets provide a safe, affordable, and effective form of disease prevention. They are designed to protect individuals from disease-carrying mosquitoes by creating a barrier that the

insects cannot permeate. Insecticide-treated mosquito nets not only provide protection but also kill mosquitoes in the process, benefiting the community at large. While mosquito nets can help in many situations, they are generally used at night, as mosquitoes tend to be more prevalent at dawn and dusk. Four people can sleep under one insecticide-treated bed net for four to five years.
