Hans then went on to introduce our speaker, our own Tim Smith.


THIS TUESDAY

Again, we find ourselves listening to those who are working alongside us in the local community. Sometimes, if not very often, we are unaware of their existence and the work they are undertaking. It is well worth coming to listen to those from whom we can exchange ideas and review the issues at hand.



SPEAKER

Our speaker for the evening was Tim Smith of Breadline Africa.

This was a chance to listen to the works of one our own members and learn what dedication means. Tim doesn't dabble. This is his work. It involves building modular classrooms, toilets, and complete centres out of shipping containers. They operate throughout the Western Cape, Eastern Cape, KZN Namibia and Zimbabwe.

Tim's talk was truly inspirational and we learned that since 1993 R120 million has been expended through the fund. That is just the money but the human effort and charitable work cannot be quantified.

The containers used to be free; just given away with no building permission needed to set up the modular kitchens, classrooms, toilets and libraries. But now the containers are R18.000 each and it is uncertain if freedom to build in this fashion will continue. As usual, there is a danger that bureaucracy intended to sort out one problem will adversely impact on another, namely this project.

As Tim set out: 61% of South African children live below what is termed the breadline and 14% are classified as being in hunger. The work that Tim and his colleagues undertake is seriously monumental and I strongly recommend that you all hook into the Breadline Africa website:

SKATEBOARD PARK

The first meeting of the ad hoc committee for the construction of the proposed Skateboard Park took place on Friday with yours truly, Butch Liebenberg, President Christine, MJ and Greg attending, the latter two being very well versed in the requirements and processes of the skateboarding fraternity.

They had already arranged for a colleague of theirs who is studying design engineering to attend Hout Bay and look at the proposed site at the end of the existing soccer pitch in the valley across from IY. There is space there which would be ideal but of course this needs government agreement. This may hopefully be forthcoming and that is where President Christine's contacts come in.

Fist things first, we need a building plan and a costing. We need a "mission statement" [a horrible modern expression] to convince government that we can use their land to their advantage [votes] and to the advantage of the local community.

If we can't get permission to build there, which we reckon is the only really good site going, with all of the necessary security and infrastructure, then we shall have to look elsewhere. But the cost is going to be more than we imagined. I know.

We may well have to get public financial support and to really get this project into first gear soon. But the enthusiasm is there.

This is an enterprise which, from the immediate success of the skateboard park in Gardens has shown, is so perfect for bringing kids and young adults from different backgrounds together. We really have to have this. Whatever it takes.

Lawden Holmes, the designer designate should be providing his plans shortly and the sub-committee will keep you all fully informed. Anyone who wishes to join the ad hoc committee would be more than welcome.
