




Alok made a cake for the occasion which was cut by our new OAM, Jenny Gorrel. Congratulations Jenny and thank you Alok.



Laurie Fromholtz was born at Leeton on 4 March 1929 to parents Mary Constance (Connie) Fromholtz, nee O'Halloran, and Herbert Fromholtz (Frommie). Laurie's family came from the area while his Mother's family were early settlers in Wagga. His Father's family originally came from Brocklesby and later Albury. They lived at Leeton and Burrinjuck Dam before coming to live in Wagga Wagga in the mid nineteen forties. Laurie has 3 brothers and two sisters.



Laurie commenced his career in Local Government as a Cadet Engineer at the Lockhart Shire Council. In 1952 Laurie took up a job with Waugoola Shire Council in Cowra and in 1967 his family shifted to Wagga. Laurie accepted a position with Wagga Wagga City Council as Design Engineer, then Deputy City Engineer before becoming City Engineer. Laurie was the last City Engineer of Wagga Wagga City Council from 1984 to 1993. Following the introduction of the new Local Government Act in 1993, Laurie became the first Director of Technical Services from 1993- 1994 when he retired to start his own business, mainly in the area of liaising with Councils and the RTA for B-Double routes and designing saleyards around Australia.

Wife Pat chose teaching as a career and when she graduated she went teaching, ending up at Lockhart, where she met Laurie, who was then a Cadet Engineer at the Lockhart Shire Council. They married in October 1951 and Laurie moved to Cowra where they produced, in quick succession, five children – four girls and then a boy.

Congratulations to Pat and Laurie on celebrating 60 years of marriage.
