

### Meeting 24th June, 2015



Dave Conway and Nav Suppiah - from Edge Employment

This week we heard from Nav Suppiah (with Dave Conway along to assist with questions) from Edge Employment. There are two offices operating, one in Subiaco and the other in Joondalup with a third in the pipeline in Cockburn.

Edge is a Not for Profit, funded by the Federal Government and was started in 1984 to assist people with disabilities to gain employment. No disabilities are disregarded for employment, physical or emotional. The disability is disclosed to the employer so that the disability can be worked with to bring the best employment outcome.

Only 7% of employers know about Edge and just 7% of those people use them for employment. There are great benefits for the employees and employers. Job support

comes from 57% of large corporations; 17% public sector and 26% small and medium businesses. A few of the many benefits to businesses are:

- Less absenteeism
- Better safety records
- Longer tenure
- Comparable productivity
- Excellent motivation, dedication and loyalty
- No greater impact on insurances and premiums, supervision and training
- Improved corporate image and workplace morale.

The eligibility for assistance from Edge is from aged 14 to 65 and people do not need to be in disability support to be eligible. There are Government incentives for employees such as wage subsidies.

#### Edge has:

- Secured more than 6,000 jobs for 2,500 people with disability since 1984
- 50% of all jobs secured are through repeat business
- Currently supporting more than 50 people with disabilities in apprenticeships and traineeships
- Support both employers and employees to bring about successful outcomes.

An extremely interesting subject, the services of which are little known.



# **Article in RDU Magazine on "Old Guard Eliciting Change"**

PRID Ken's article in the June RDU Magazine, "Old Guard Eliciting Change" has drawn interest and enquiries from Rotarians in both New Zealand and Melbourne.

With Rotary membership declining at a frightening rate, it needs drastic measures to turn the tide. In Australia, membership has dropped from 40,000 in 1995 to 31,000 in 2015. A loss of almost 25%. The figures in WA are more dramatic with 1995 there being 4,000 members in the State, this dropped to 3,000 in 2005 and falling still further to 2,500 in 2015.

The RC Freshwater Bay has turned this trend around, growing in membership of all ages, from 20s to 70s, (9 in their 20s),14 different nationalities with more female members than males.

Also written up in the RDU June edition was the RC Crawley, who loosely set themselves up on changes made by the RCFB. However, they are obtaining 'two year scholarships for students' and rapidly raced up to 109 members. With a passage of time, this significant figure has slid back to in the 70s as it would appear that once the 'two year scholarship' is up the students pass on out the other side of the club. Hence the membership is not sustained and the students do not remain members of the club.

#### **Update on all Avenues of Service projects**

With it being the end of the Rotary year, whilst there is a substantial amount happening for the secretary in Club Service, the other committees of Community/Vocational, International and Youth are minimal as one Rotary year is concluding and the new year is about to take off. There are a few updates on projects as per below.

As reported in the last bulletin, two students have been identified by Di Wilcox to receive Seedling Citizenship Awards at Aubin Grove PS, however, a date and time is still to be advised.

# Rotary releases US\$40.3 Million to End Polio worldwide



The continued fight to stamp out polio will receive an additional \$40.3 million boost from Rotary in support of immunization activities and research to be carried out by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

The funds will be used by the World Health Organization (WHO) and UNICEF for polio immunization, surveillance and research activities in ten countries, as well as to provide technical assistance to additional countries in Africa.

The funding commitment comes at a critical time as Nigeria – the last polio-endemic country in Africa – approaches one-year since its last case of polio, which occurred in Kano State on 24 July, 2014. If the current progress continues, WHO may remove Nigeria from the list of polio-endemic countries as early as September. In addition to the notable progress in Nigeria, no new cases of polio have been reported anywhere in Africa since August 2014. Experts do, however, strongly caution that it is too soon to fully celebrate. Nigeria needs to go an additional two years without polio to be certified polio-free.

Funding and support for high-quality immunization campaigns and surveillance activities will be key to sustaining current gains. The only two other polioendemic countries, Pakistan and Afghanistan, continue to experience hurdles in polio eradication campaigns including inaccessibility to children and security. Last year, Pakistan saw an outbreak which resulted in more than 300 cases, the highest number in the country in more than a decade. As a result, Pakistan accounted for almost 90% of the world's cases. However, there has been improvement in 2015. Cases are down nearly 70% over this same time in 2014.

Progress against polio, while significant, remains fragile. Rotary's funds will support immunization efforts in: \$9.9 million in Nigeria; \$12.2 million in Pakistan and \$2.3 million in Afghanistan. Additional funds will support efforts to keep other at-risk countries polio-free. The grants include \$1 million, Cameroon: \$900,000, Chad; \$2 million, Democratic Republic of Congo; \$1.1 million, Ethiopia; \$1 million, Niger; \$1.5 million, Somalia; and \$1.5, South Sudan. In addition, grants totalling \$5.8 million will provide surveillance in African and Eastern Mediterranean regions. Grants to Africa alone total \$19 million. In total, Rotary has donated \$688.5 million to support polio eradication efforts in Africa over the past thirty years.

I came across these photos recently and decided to take members into a small window of Rotary International, a world shared by Ken and me for many years.


PRIP Cliff Dochterman is seen above in his office in his home in Morago, California with PRIP Frank Devlyn from Mexico.

Our first real personal contact with Cliff (a wonderful speech maker – speeches made into a book, which I have quoted from often plus he wrote the ABCs of Rotary) was in December of 1991, when we were in his office at Rotary Headquarters when he was incoming RI President. With his usual wicked sense of humour he was sorting through cards with his Secretary Anne, and said to Ken that they were organising RI Committees for his year as President and deciding who'd been 'naughty or nice'. Ken wondered as he left the office if he'd been 'naughty or nice'. As he was given three very large jobs on RI Taskforces we guess he'd been very nice!

As **President**, **Cliff's Theme** was "**Real Happiness is Helping Others**" and there is nothing truer. Cliff's sense of humour was such that when in a lift he spoke to a man wearing a Rotary pin. The Rotarian said he was the President of a Rotary Club. Cliff said he was a President too, but neglected to expand the statement to 'of the whole Rotary world'. We served on the Rotary Foundation Trustees with Cliff and PRIP Frank for several years.

Frank Devlyn we've known prior to his first visit to Perth in 1985. Ken served on many committees with Frank over the years and then ended up on his Board when Frank was RI President, having served on the nominating Committee to select Frank as President. Frank's Theme was 'Create Awareness, Take Action' and he had so many emphasis during his year as President we wondered if he'd achieve anything. He

achieved significantly with his major emphasis avoidable blindness.



Two books recently released on two more dear friends who have passed on.

OP Vaish, from Delhi India, a friend for so long, and whom we served with for both years on the RI Board. Paulo Costa from Brazil served as RI President 1990-91 and had as his Theme Honour Rotary with Faith and Enthusiasm. As President, Paulo decided to Honour Rotarians who had Honoured Rotary and it was when he was President that PRID Ken (then PDG) was selected as the most Exemplary Rotarian in the entire World and the most Exemplary Rotarian in the (then) ANZO Region. Until his untimely death post elective surgery, in his booming voice he would put his arm around Ken's shoulder and point at him and say to me or whoever may have been around "Number one Rotarian in the world!" We spent some of our years on the Rotary Foundation Trustees with Paulo plus shared a Coup in the Philippines.
