GENERAL BUSINESS

MEETINGS

There was a long discussion on the conduct and venues for the meetings.

We have a serious problem with attendance with 19 members on our books now 18 since Max Chapman moved to Wagga Wagga, we are only getting 6-7 members attend on a regular basis. With make ups we usually can report a 60% attendance rate.

Some of the items discussed included (In no order of importance):

- Venue: time to look at other venues on a rotation basis. Some present felt that the restaurant at the club has no atmosphere and is not conducive for prospective new members and some current members to make it a regular event.
- Meetings at members' homes was suggested, on a rotational basis.
- The cost of \$20 per meal for a very average meal was uppermost in the minds of some members.
- As we have 25% of our members as a husband and wife couple the cost becomes significant.
- For a younger member still working with family this cost is too high at \$20 every week.
- Take-away meals maybe one answer.
- Meetings should be over in 1 hour not 2.5 hours.

- Business should not be discussed until the meal is over.
- Two meetings per month for business should be ample leaving two meetings for fellowship.
- Sunrise club cited as a good example of how meetings should be conducted.

CONCLUSION: We have to continue the discussion at subsequent meetings once President Marg Perkin has returned and takes over as our president. Unless we listen to our new members and some of our older members, we will not increase our membership and we are in danger of losing more members unless we can get consensus and a better way forward.

The truth is that we have 18 members on the books plus 2 Honourary members; of these, 12 are regular attendees (some weekly, most every two weeks). We also have 5 on the Rotary books (both RI and RDU) who do not attend for one reason or the other. The club pays fees for these members; some are financial, although some are not.

The time has come to be fair dinkum and realistic about our membership base and how we go about our business for the future. We have some exciting projects ahead of us, including the Shop Local Campaign, re-engaging the youth of Coolamon and the Mountains of the Moon climb.
