The bulk of the meeting was a presentation by Helen McLoughlin, the librarian of the Coolamon Library. Helen surprised most in attendance when she described the wide range of activities and services provided through the library, many of which don't involve reading or books at all! Of course, the library has a good collection of traditional books and access to many others through cooperative arrangements with other libraries, but other forms of books and printed resources include books on CD (with a CD player that can be borrowed from the library), a microfiche reader and microfilms of local newspapers going back to the early 1900s, e-books, etc. Probably most surprising is the availability of household power meters that can be borrowed by individuals wishing to learn how much

President's Report



18 June – We had another good turn out for our dinner meeting. This was a great way to wrap up the last of the guest speaker dinner meetings for my year as President, with our guest speaker, Helen McLoughlan, the Library Assistant at the Coolamon Library. She highlighted a number of activities that the library is involverd in, many of which some members were unaware of.

The library is almost 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years old, having evolved from the mobile Library van that used to service towns in the shire. It is part of the UTDS precinct and a great attribute to Community needs.

Some of the activities that Helen spoke about are: monthly children's storytime and associated craft activities (theme based), a meeting place for community groups (small kitchen available), teaching older citizens how to use the computer (basic instruction but will develop as the need asises), school group /preschool visits, a one off pizza night for senior students where they were able to come to the library after hours to complete assessment tasks and the like, a night for women to celebrate Womens' Day with guest speakers and nibbles on arrival and purchase of new books, DVDs for borrowing. All borrowing articles are only 5 years old or less. There is a concerted effort to ensure new technology is available, e.g. talking books.

The Coolamon Library is linked to the Riverina Library so any books/DVDs that people want can be accessed for \$1. The library ensures that it delivers to the shire and that it is not Coolamon focused, so activities are organised in other towns within the Shire. Two Book Clubs have been established; the one I'm in is in its 4th year and the other one is in its 2nd year. The Library also has photocopy and computer use facilities along with daily local newspapers. Libraries are no longer places where you just borrow books!

It is obvious that Helen loves her job and we are lucky that she is such a good "front of house." She liases with the Council for funding submissions and also liases with Bronwyn Hatty, the Youth Worker. Thank you to Neil who delivered the vote of thanks.

Next week will be the last for my year and Kim will be catering for this. You have been asked to let Garth know if you are coming for catering purposes. We will also be folding up raffle tickets on this night in preparation for the raffle draw at Changeover.
