# **SECRETARY'S REPORT**

# ROTARY ASSISTS AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARS TO LEAVE EGYPT

As you are all well aware Rotary is concentrating on the eradication of polio throughout the world. Here is an interesting take on the work being done in Africa from a Rotarian who is directly involved in the field:

Let me put the polio initiative in a different perspective: This also give me an opportunity of expressing my views.

In most African countries, Bill Gates does not do auto promotion! We do. This because of our \$200 million Challenge, which has raised \$555 million! and we also publicise the other partners in our media outings!

We started it in 1985 and made some good progress, but with an even better progress in the PR department so much as to collect double the target amount. It was unique and it was OUR project, and we could go out to do what we had set without interference. All we needed, we thought, was the cooperation of the affected countries. We knew that no country would take the risk of refusing vaccines free. Unfortunately there were a lot of factors between giving vaccines and the children getting it!

Since 1988, when the World Health Assembly adopted Polio Eradication as a viable goal, it gave us relief as we, professionals in our field, were not Public Health Professionals, and so many parameters had never even crossed our mind when we started implementing Polio plus. (I have stories, which I will one day put out, of the difficulties faced, as the perspective in the affected countries, and the work involved, was very much different from what the rest of the Rotary world thought it to be.)

Since 1988, Eradication of Polio is NOT a stand-alone programme of Rotary International. The GPEI (Global Polio Eradication Initiative) has 4 partners of which 3, apart from Rotary, are technical partners, UNICEF, World Health Organisation, & Centre for Disease Control, plus the Ministries of Health in each affected country. Kudos to our leaders who did not give up paternity of our project, and even accepted the 'de-factor legation' that we were subjected to in most of the effected countries. It was not the same in the polio free countries! It was, understandably difficult to get the Ministry, WHO and UNICEF local leaders to understand that it was originally our idea and that the funds they were spending came largely through us, either directly, or by Rotary advocacy:

'A bunch of privileged leaders meeting weekly over meals and cocktails to discuss various things and do some philanthropy on the side' was not their idea of people who could play an active part

in eradicating a disease. We really had a tough job to burst the illusion, and I am proud to say that as Rotarians, we did what we do best: succeed!

Enormous work went into the process, with patience as fuel, to get them to accept us as equal partners, and in many countries, as the funding partners at least. Resistance dropped, but is still there in many polio affected countries, in Asia and Africa, and every new set of bosses at country and state level have to be broken down and shown the light. Our Light. That is the work which Rotarians like me and our Colleagues do in Africa and Asia. We take part in the decision making process through our mandatory participation in the country level ICC (Inter-agency Coordinating Committee) that is entrusted with the NIDS (National Immunisation Days. It is true that Rotary participation is not at the same level in all the affected countries, but at least one thing is sure, they know Rotary and its role.

Our Social Mobilization policies put the name of Rotary up front, with all other partners also claiming their rightful place on our messages, and this continuing process is such that our visibility has grown stronger with us managing to put in that least three logos (the wheel, the Polio Plus Logo, and the End Polio Now) in all items with one each for WHO, UNICEF, CDC & the Ministry of Health. The best thing is they do not even mind it anymore as our End Polio Now logo in RED is the big one with the evident message.

The argument is that the approach in the affected countries HAS to be different from the one churned out from the PR in HQs. In the countries where polio exists, we have to keep the delicate balance not to offend our partners. Where we still have the virus, or threatening to come back, PR is done but in a different way.

In countries where there is no Polio, generally considered the Western world, our role is to tout out achievements AND to collect funds which are so badly needed and more easily available than in the developing world. The 'This close' programme has the message on the top with a plea for donations. Fortunately the phrase 'This Close' is in larger letters so most do not even read the inscription above.

Since the 20 odd personalities are known iconic faces, it clicks in the ads along with the regular plea where we can collect funds. It would be indelicate for us to put just the This close ad and ask people to vaccinate, because this poster asks for donations! Till last year we concocted our own Ads, and now use the 'this close' ad as a part of a larger ad with the logos of all the partners. As a Zone Challenge Coordinator for the 200 Million Challenge, I know how difficult it is to raise money in my zone, Africa. Whatever I have succeeded is NOT because of the This close Ad, but by active participation of the Local THIS CLOSE Ambassador, who is also a Unicef goodwill Ambassador, in the fundraising activities, as well as in advocacy and Social Mobilizing activities. (I am told that soon every Tom Dick & Harry can do the ad shortly in an interactive version. The 20-odd stars who have lent the name to Rotary, free, instead of the millions they charge for commercial ads, would surely not like to see that they are being equated with a 'nobody'! ) This is something for the RI to do a rethink!

These ads are great! They made an excellent backdrop at San Diego because they are known and respected faces that can open 'closed doors' in the advocacy department. Let us not banalise them in the interest of PR in a local level! (NIDs in India are so well trumpeted on the National media TV etc, and even our 'this close' Ambassador Amitabh urges people to take their children for the two drops, but it is the Governments who put in this staccato of ads and often Rotary does not even figure in them. It is the same universally known face, different two forefingers fingers, but the message is still clear: vaccinate your children! should we complain? then years back a frustrated me would have said yes. Today I just want the job to be done!)

Stickers like 'Goodbye Polio, Thank you Rotary', is good for feeling good and fund raising activities in Polio Free Countries. In countries where there is still the Final inch, we dare not do this. It's not that we do not use this medium, but our lines are more on the lines of Goodbye Polio, Thank you Nigerians, or 'thank you all' or something like this with a Rotary Logo to show who is saying it. Nobody would want the NID executing Health Ministry and partners to get offended by Rotary claiming to be the only party that has made the GOODBYE possible! Once the world is polio free, we can blow our trumpet with pride wherever we want it!

Most of the countries in Africa have accepted the role that Rotary plays and has played. Infrastructure has improved; health centres are equipped with medical and non medical materials like Cold Chains, vehicles, generators, megaphones etc. A system of logistics has evolved, which helps in campaigns for other diseases. Campaigns can be programmed in short notice, so mop-ups when there are outbreaks are done rapidly! NIDs permit the 'plus' activities like Vitamin A, de-worming, mosquito nets, etc which would require enormous resources if they were stand alone programmes! Medical Personnel are now trained on the concept of Public Health activities and so much more... and this is the best PR of Rotary, and I am proud to say that the PR division of RI and the Foundation trustees play an important, pro-active and encouraging part in this execution of the project in the playing fields where polio is still a scourge!

After 26 years in this field I am no longer offended when Rotary is not mentioned in a speech, knowing fully well that the population and the people who matter know what we do. Rotary, UNICEF, WHO, CDC et all have their own web sites for their own; often with links to the other partners, in which Rotary does figure. It is the combined effort of all that makes things work, so let us keep PR in affected countries separate from that in the Polio Free countries and leave it to National Committees who master the environment they work in have all the parameters in hand, rather than by PR managers whose unilateral bursts may undo the work done for so many years.


