An observation and a little history about Hout Bay Rotary - Don Peters

As our Sgt has recently told us its good to have the 'swallows' back and they come with good news, great ideas and plenty of enthusiasm. How special it is to create contacts by ourselves with the traditional make-ups when we are travelling and of course to welcome visiting Rotarians to our own Club.

When the table mats were first designed and the originals were to identify the Ashley Kaimowitz Memorial Fund we thought they would be 'interesting' and hopefully 'informative'. It has worked, many of the mats have 'left' us and travelled to various Rotary Clubs around the world. Patrick's contribution with the 'Operation Medical Hope" project table mat added to the interest that our Club was creating with visiting Rotarians. May I just identify some interesting cases where the contact with a Rotarian from another Club in another country have benefitted projects in our own community.

Each week we toast the Coolamon Club in Australia, we are twinned but lets start from the beginning. Rotarian John Glassford of the Coolamon Club contacted the Hout Bay Club and told a story about climbing a mountain with a team from Australia to raise funds for Rotary projects in Africa. I am simplifying the story – with great respect to John Glassford from whom I seek his indulgence. John's initial approach was (and we do perhaps is some cases have to apologise for a degree of disbelief) perhaps misunderstood or was far to progressive for a Hout Bay Rotarian to comprehend. But like a kookaburra (a laughing jackass) this strange cry from an Australian Rotarian grew and we realised that this was someone special.

The success of the Kili climb and the support given by Coolamon and other neighbour clubs in Aussie was amazing. So what was it? Fellow Rotarians talking, writing, emailing each other because friendships, support, generosity and a bonding that has provided Rotary Hout Bay for Operation Medical Hope and also for the Nonceba Centre project with amazing financial and personal rewards.

The continuing contact with Coolamon and John Glassford gets stronger and stronger, not because of any great fund raising scheme but because of that personal contact and esprit de corps that we enjoy with each other.

In Bay Breezes last week and at our meeting Tuesday before last you have heard about the generosity of the Luton Chiltern Rotary Club in England, again let us start at the beginning and give recognition to another visiting Rotarian, Harold Allsopp. Here is a Rotarian with a holiday home in Hout Bay attending our Clubs meetings during his stay and taking note of what our Club was doing and then on returning to his own Club telling them about us.

Because of Harold's belief in Rotary and the opportunity it gave him to meet and make new friends his 'reports' to Luton Chiltern Club have resulted in many very generous donations from his Club.

Like the Coolamon Club, because of Harold's report back each time he visits, contact has got stronger and stronger and again not because of any fund raising activity.

Patrick, whilst running Operation Medical Hope, and it started in 1999, has met many who have helped.

The late Cecil Graham, a member of our Club, and Rae his wife, an Honorary Member, introduced their daughter and it's a beautiful story of the introductions that followed on resulting in the establishing of contact with USA Rotary Clubs that formed a major part of the Matching Grant for OMH. More recently the President of a Rotary Club in Melbourne, Australia wrote to Patrick and again a fantastic bonding and the additional surprise of financial assistance.

Few of us will remember the Fire Engine that came from Dorset all because of personal contact between a member of our Club, Prof Cecil Block and a Club in Dorset where he had attended a meeting.

Hans Kuhn, a Rotarian from Switzerland originally, but because of his Rotary contacts was able to provide amazing funding for the Small Business Project. Fedde Renkema whose contacts and family helped with the sustaining of the bursary fund.

Another Hout Bay ex member and now an Honorary member, John Whitton whose cousin in the Howden Rotary Club in England was a major contributor to two Matching Grants the Club had.

Mirjam Anema, another ex member who returned to live in Holland and supported the bursary scheme.

Of course I am bound to have forgotten someone, so let's say this is part one of the history of members. Can I make the observation that the contact between fellow Rotarians internationally has been immensely important for Hout Bay Rotary? It underlines the need for us to be far more active when we are meeting visiting Rotarians at our Club.

There will be some comment about other methods of fund raising and yes, Hout Bay has been pretty successful. In 1986 we raffled a computer and made R10 000 which went immediately as the Club's donation to the opening of Polio Plus.

An ambulance project collected from the community of Hout Bay and resulted in an ambulance completely fitted out being based in the valley.

But the real successes have been those where there has been that personal contact, this is a strength of our Club, this is something we are comfortable with and it is an area that we must make every effort to strengthen and particularly when visiting Rotarians are with us.
