Dramatic changes in alcohol laws

In force as at 1st April

- No alcohol can be sold for off-consumption (ie to take home) on Sundays, except for wineries. In addition to high rents, this is one of the reasons given by Caroline Rillema for closing her Waterfront store, which previously was able to trade on Sundays. Green Point Ultra Liquors, Harley's in Wale Street, Midmar in Green Point will all now close on Sundays.
- No alcohol can be sold for off-consumption after 6pm on weekdays. Anyone who previously enjoyed a tasting and shopping session at Wine Concepts, Woolies or Vino Pronto on their way home – sorry.
- No sale of more than 150 litres of alcohol to any one person unless they have a liquor licence or special permission from the Chairman of the Liquor Board. Buying for your daughter's engagement party or your Mom's 60th birthday? Better start limiting your guests. And even if you buy it.....
- No-one may keep more than 150 litres of wine in their home without a liquor licence. That's 200 bottles folks. And that's it.
- No drinking alcohol in vehicles – not even if you are sitting in the back of a minibus and have a 100% sober driver. Makes a bit of a mockery of responsible people having a designated driver doesn't it?
- No drinking at school functions ever. This applies even if the function is held away from school grounds and on a licenced premises - if it is the school organising the function, they are breaking the law.

From the beginning of next month, there is every chance that many of us will be breaking the law, even if we think we are doing the 'right thing' - as Danie puts it 'these changes are making criminals out of ordinary people.'

Dear Don

Hope all is well with you and your family.

On Thursday 21 February 2013 a meeting was held between Hout Bay High School, Hout Bay CARES (drug center) and BEN (Bicycle Empowerment Network). We all agreed that because we working in one community and we cater for the same learners, we might as well work together.

The problem Hout Bay High School has is that we need the man-power and we need assistance with maintenance on our bicycles. Hout Bay CARES has offered all their assistance and BEN offered to give one of their recruits (Lluwellyn Frans a recovered drug addict) another chance by rendering a service to the community of Hangberg. Lluwellyn was trained by BEN to service and repair bicycles. He will be the person to service and repair the bicycles of both organizations, with the assistance of BEN.

A meeting between Juan Julius (principal) and Jurgens Smith (HBCARES) has been arranged for next week. The aim of this meeting will be about the container (sponsored by the Rotary Club – Don Peters) to be utilized as a bicycle repair shop/workshop. I just need to bring this under your attention that if a decision is made that the container must be moved to another location where it is accessible to the community and that both organizations will be making use of this facility, and that you the Rotary Club would be fine with this decision. The school on the other hand has no problem by assisting with electricity, water and safety of the container and to accommodate the container. The problem would be after school hours, weekends and school holidays. All concerns will be dealt with at the meeting and the best decision will be made to accommodate all parties involved.

Hope that the decisions that will be made will be in good faith of the school, the drug center and the community.
