Yesterday, the day that Rainer spoke to the Club was the anniversary of Karl Benz successfully applying for patents on the first petrol driven carriage, Karl presented his patents on the twenty ninth of January 1886, one hundred and twenty seven years ago. The engine that powered the carriage was designed by Nikolaus Otto.

The company Daimler is of course special for Rainer and his varied life in the far East representing the company was fascinating and thank you Rainer for such an interesting talk.

I to have a little story to tell about the Daimler company. My previous career in Zimbabwe saw me as Secretary and Comptroller of the Household to the President of Zimbabwe, the Secretarial position lasted until a comrade from the struggle arrived one day to relieve me of the post. The Comptroller of the Household position lasted some time longer until the Presidents Uncle who had recently retired from his gardening position arrived to take over from me. Prior to my departure back to the Intelligence Service from which I had been seconded I assisted in preparing a draft of the retirement package for the Zimbabwean President. Mugabe at Independence was a Prime Minister but it was well known that he would change roles and become an executive President hence the reason for the early preparation of documentation for the Presidents retirement. This document was unique in the world in respect of the entitlements of a retiring President as it included in its preamble that the retiring President of the Republic of Zimbabwe together with the agreed financial package would also receive a Mercedes Benz motor vehicle. It was a piece of information that Daimler Benz didn't dwell on when advertising.

Keith and Alison Bull - more Dictionaries gratefully received.

On Monday 28 January Alison and I delivered 40 Usborne illiustrated English Dictionaries (20 from Rotary Hout Bay and 20 from Totnes Rotary, UK) to the headmistress at Oranjekloof Primary school. The school holds some 1,200 children, mainly from Imazamo Yethu and class sizes regularly exceed the 40 mark. The children work in groups and share the dictionaries. The headmistress was most appreciative of the donation and asked us to thank both Rotary Clubs for their interest in the school.

On the same day, I visited the new Disa High School based in the old YMCA grounds, and found a very different environment with the old buildings/containers recently refurbished and containing brand new furniture. Led by headmaster Angus Duffet, (who met me wearing collar and tie!), he is endeavouring to instill values that lead to the children aspiring to escape from the township mentality. I similarly handed over 40 dictionaries (split as above) and for which again, he was most appreciative.

The school has about 260 students, half of which are from IY, in two grades (8 and 9). Grade 8 classes are limited to 35 maximum and Grade 9 only 30 learners. The plan is to expand the school to cover all grades in time.

He was extremely interested and impressed with Hout Bay Rotary Club's bursary programme for students, and would like some of our candidates who are now at University, to come to the school and show as an example of how the children, through hard work, can lift themselves out of their history. He also agreed to come and talk to the club once he has his feet properly under the table.

I also met one of the English teachers who volunteered she was a member of Interact in her Durban school before she went to university. A target for Rotary Club of Hout Bay could be to re-invigorate an Interact programme in the schools?

In response on hearing the following on Cape Talk news this afternoon (whilst I was doing Neighbourhood Watch patrol!), I decided to SMS John Maytham and make a plug for Rotary.

The news item said that South Africa's first black billionaire, Patrice Motsepe, had signed up for the Giving Pledge, becoming the first African to join some of the world's wealthiest people in donating vast sums of personal wealth to the poor.

Mining magnate Motsepe, with assets estimated by Forbes magazine of \$2.65 billion, said he is making the pledge to benefit the millions of South Africans who have seen little gain in their personal fortunes since white-minority rule ended in 1994.

The Giving Pledge is a philanthropic initiative started by U.S. billionaire Warren Buffet along with Bill and Melinda Gates that has recruited nearly 100 billionaires, mostly Americans, who have pledged to donate the majority of their wealth to charity.

The SMS read ' the announcement about the new charitable foundation offers exciting opportunities. A decade ago, Rotary Foundation pledged US\$500m to rid the world of polio. Bill Gates Foundation matched that. Now there are only 3 countries on the globe where polio exists and they are war zones. Rotary, with 33,000 clubs world-wide provided the assurances that the money is being used properly . Rotarian Keith from Hout Bay'

John Maytham read the SMS out verbatim and added that this was a really interesting addendum to the pledge and thanked me for the idea.
