LAST TUESDAY

For those not entirely familiar with Rotary Club of Hout Bay Procedure, the SAR is effectively the Master of Ceremonies and performs many of the functions that on a meeting by meeting basis, are usually carried out by the President.

Either way, the result is a fun packed guide through the delights of the evening and this last Tuesday was a particular delight with young Nicky Lloyd presenting on behalf of Ikhaya le Themba, the project of which she Director. However, before we get to that we have to make mention of the "spots" and other matters taking place before the main event.

David introduced Ashlev Newell of All Out Africa who, as a Hout Bay Rotary Club Volunteer, is a regular guest and the one who guite some time ago, enlightened us to the existence, and needs, of Ikhaya le Themba and brought Nicky Lloyd along to give us some indepth learning.

John Connor from the Rotary Club of Chester was present once more and was welcomed handsomely as was Julie Searle, a repeat visitor who, with some expectation may join our ranks.

Also welcomed were President John's daughter, Joanne Roelofz who has been down for a family/business visit from JHB. We had guests from Belgium in the delightful shape of Arlette Pylyser together with John Wilson who is a member at Roodeport Rotary Club. They attended with Jaby from Ostend who exchanged banners. [see photos later in this edition]

The Ostend Club is the oldest outside of the USA and has 45 members. Jaby told us that for the past 11 years their main project has been helping terminally ill cancer patients as well as assisting an orphanage and school for dependents of sailors and their families.

With "spots" open to the floor John Connor, our quest from Chester, stepped in with a Liverpool / Everton joke which I won't go into here. The winning protagonist of the joke though was of course Everton.

Keith Bull stood to inform the club that we are now sending two more students to University under our bursary scheme. This is a particularly difficult time emotionally for the students but in practical terms they have to have laptops, bedding and blankets. Does anyone have a functional laptop? Maybe three or four years old max or just running well with up to date O/S. it would really help.

Ashley Newell [Volunteer Rotarian and working with All Out Africa] took a "spot" to remind us that there is a meeting of the Imizamu Yethu Health Forum strategy group Thursday NEXT WEEK. Hans Kuhn has already said he would be there but the more the better. This institution is the driving force behind the Clinic and much more.

Ashley then informed us that she was taking on a second job over and above her All Out Africa work. She is joining an NGO called Ikasico which is has been set up by Jason Roberts, the IY Restaurateur who spoke to us a while back. The organisation is taking 12 young men from the township under its wings to teach them leadership skills.

Ashley then was asked to introduce the speaker for the evening, Nicky Lloyd who heads up the Ikhaya le Themba project in Imizamu Yethu.

Ashley has been involved with Ikhaya le Themba for some time now in her capacity here heading up the All out Africa program. she and Nicky are clearly good friends and Ashley told us how impressed she is with the loyalty and respect shown by the staff toward Nicky.

SPEAKER - NICKY LLOYD - IKHAYA LE THEMBA

With a short video presentation to add to the talk, Nicky took us through the programs run at this incredible organisation where she has been Director for the past 2 years.

Ikhaya le Themba means "home of hope" and operates with a staff of eleven [mostly from the community] in the heart of the informal settlement to give faith based holistic care to the orphans and vulnerable children after school. They also home visit as needed.

The after-school program includes literacy and mathematics classes which are vital skills to progress through school. Many would fall hopelessly behind without this help which is set up to be fun and friendly.

They also work closely with parents who often are suffering from a crisis of dignity. Not being able to find work to support your family is demoralising and damaging. Ikhaya le Themba staff give classes to train these parents and the project has developed a networking system in the area making it easier in many cases to find work. As Nicky reminded us, it is so much easier to find work at a company or institution when someone within that company or institution knows you and can vouch for you.

Nicky took a moment to thank us for the towels, curtains, dressing gowns and other items which were delivered courtesy of Don Peters' initiative with Radisson Hotels.

It costs something in the order of R90,000 per month to run Ikhaya le Themba and provide the support needed. RC Hout Bay has helped in the past with feeding and kitchen utensils. More is always needed and I know that we shall be looking at assisting on a more regular basis if we can

Pick n Pay Argus Cycle Tour 2014

Affectionately know as "the Argus" and the "Rotary cycle tour" but probably to most of us in Hout Bay Rotary its just the "Argus".

This year 2014 will be the 28th time I have helped to organise the marshal activity for Hout Bay Rotary. Why does Hout Bay Rotary help? Who do we help? and How do we help? all questions I am sure you can answer.

The word monotonous – lacking in variety, tedious through sameness, boring and tiresome; so each year seeking expressions of encouragement for the members of Club who are going to volunteer yet again to marshal have to be found.

On Wednesday evening at an Argus briefing a representative of the Cycle Trust, a member of Claremont Club and an old friend actually of our Club, PP Paul de Groot was given an opportunity to say thank you for other Clubs assistance. Paul did give us what I earlier referred to as expressions of encouragement and I will share them now with you all.

The Cycle Tour this year will have 35 000 riders, 7500 of those riders are part of the 'Charity Bonds' scheme the Cycle Trust created and these riders are representing 113 individual charities. In simple terms, the charities approach the Trust and "buy" entrance for their selected number of riders. The estimates are that each of these 'charity riders' will raise R3000 so charities will benefit to the tune of R22.5 million. All that money going directly to the charities concerned with no percentages being left behind for the Trust or anyone else. Of course there are also riders sponsored by friends, businesses, etc for named charities at so many rand a KM completed, I am not going to guess on a total.

But in addition to this R22.5 million the Cycle Trust will generate approx. R6 million which is divided 50/50 between Claremont Rotary and Pedal Power. As we are aware the Claremont Club generously pay out an extra 'bonus' to those clubs that have assisted and this is in addition to the 'earnings' our Club makes per head for marshalling.

I will not dwell on the historic values our Club has gained over the 28 years of participation by our Club, it has been substantial and without any doubt the 'Argus' earnings have been significant. The figures above makes us realise the value of the 'Argus' to so many charities and it gives each of us an opportunity to 'sell' the event to any critic who is supposedly inconvenienced for a few hours once a year.

President John and indeed all previous Presidents of Hout Bay Rotary have, do and will recognise your contribution as a member of the Club and that wonderful band of friends and relatives who add to our number on that one special day for the 'ARGUS', thank you for your participation.
