

Rotary Club of Hout Bay Bay Breezes



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LAST TUESDAY

Was an interesting evening [as is usual for us].

We had a plethora of visitors to swell our numbers on a beautiful Hout Bay evening.

Peter and Lois German joined us again on their annual pilgrimage to our fair land. Peter is a member at Marylebone RC in the United Kingdom and it was good to see him and Lois back and in such fine form.

Fedde's brother [he shall always be known as Fedde's brother I think as he is never introduced in any other manner] was again welcomed to our club. As most of us know and we all should know, he is a solid contributor to the Bursary Scheme we have running so successfully.

Tony and Sue Cove from Terry Eldrid's Fareham RC joined us for the evening. Some of us will recall Tony's "speaker" talk from last year. John Connor from Chester RC and a good friend of Allan Walker was in attendance again. John should be familiar to us from previous years

when he has come over, which he has been doing for the past 10 years. We also welcomed back Rolf Schnauffer who is regular at our meetings when he is in Hout Bay and not in the Ukraine. Being the smart man he is, he is not there at the moment.

Our Sergeant At Arms for the evening was Patrick McLaughlin, standing in for our David Heath and a fine job did Patrick do. With no designated speaker for the evening Patrick, in consultation with President John decreed a "round robin" of the guests to tell us of their projects and club activities thereafter having some of our directors of service give a little information back across the table, so to speak.

John Connor from Chester RC stood to tell us that his Chester RC is 99 years old! Since Rotary itself was only founded on 23 February 1905 [109 years ago] that is a heck of an accolade.

Chester RC has 32 members but there are two other local clubs which have been set up by them.

Current projects of note are in respect of Syria charities. They have sent 8 shelter boxes to Syria! Eight! So well done.

John's club is also actively involved with prison welfare and they support a scheme whereby bikes are repaired in local prisons and shipped to South Africa.

While here John is supporting the Opera in the Convent Garden which I shall report further on later.

Feede Renkema then gave a quick run-down of our Bursary scheme operation which has now been running some 5 or 6 years. We have 8 students enrolled at the moment all of which take quite some mentoring and cost around R65,000 each per year.

Fedde mentioned some of our great successes including Nicole Saunders who, while not a university graduate applied herself equally hard under her circumstances to obtain her beautician qualifications and is now supporting herself and her family.

Cynthia is another heartwarming success story. She is in the final stages of her studies to qualify as an accountant. She has been accepted on KPMG's own support scheme. She has work study placement with them now and has employment terms with them when she qualifies.

Hans Kuhn was asked to say a few words on Education and he obliged with quite a few! As Hans told us, Education is used as a "weapon" in local and National politics which inevitably detracts from the real job at hand. With the focus on political point scoring there is less actually being done on the ground from that direction. We have to fill the void and to intervene to make the difference. How we go about this is complex and demanding but we will make a start with Interact which is what Hans is working on at the moment. His plan is to integrate learners from different schools rather than have an "after school" club at one learners establishment.

Patrick McLaughlin gave us a brief resumé of the Operation Medical Hope scheme which, having completed the building of the IY clinic some time past is now in Phase 3 which constitutes the work to prevent the spread of AIDS / HIV through education, testing, treating and feeding. This last element is vital since the treatment programs fail if the dietary needs of the patient are not met. Colin Sutherland, our Treasurer, gave us a summary of our finances reminding us that although we had a healthy balance in long term account that was largely accounted for already and, although we are now entirely clear of debts [particularly to RI] we have only R65,000 in

We have however, been able to afford two shelter box donations, one of which went out to the Philippines and the other we believe is going to remain on standby awaiting immediate despatch to the next disaster.

Colin also reminded us that, taking on two more bursary students this year adds a financial commitment for the club of R65,000 for each.

Could I, as editor, take this opportunity to give a special thanks to Colin for his inestimable contribution to the Club in his capacity as Treasurer? I know from past experience that it is not an easy task and pretty thankless most of the time but here and now I would like to extend those thanks not from just myself as member and Editor but from all of those who have privately mentioned to me that they appreciate Colin's hard work and above all the clarity he brings to club finances.

There were many other inputs to the conversations with questions and responses from guests and members alike. It was a really good airing of what we are about, not just as a club but as Rotarians the world over.
