Dear Supporters

This is to thank you most sincerely for the generous donation which you gave to sponsor me for the Cape Argus Cycle Race on Sunday. The race was held yesterday in the Cape Peninsula, in warm but windy conditions, and over 35,000 people took part, men and women and children of all ages, sizes and colours. It was a memorable occasion. Because of the wind many of us took longer to finish than we had hoped. We had fifty riders for Breadline Africa, and have still to find out how many finished the race.

In total through your generosity I raised R 11,700 in South Africa and £ 637.94 through the UK website Justgiving, which makes a total of over R 23,000.00 The funds will be used towards a new pre-school for the children of Zoleka in Philippi, and we will keep you informed of the progress of the project.

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FROM JOHN GLASSFORD- response to Keith's talk

G 'day

There has been a lot of activity in the past few days with the Rotary Club of Hout Bay in Cape Town showing the presentation on RAGES. Hout Bay and the Rotary Club of Kenton-on-Sea through Jo Wilmot have also been having a chat.

As a result we have had 15 new registrations arrive in my in box overnight.

A very warm welcome to you all and I promise that we are not here for a chat but to engage Rotarains in the preservation of endangered species.

Rtn. Keith Bull from Hout Bay did the presentation and was asked this question on the burning of blood ivory:

"If we burn all the 'legal' stockpiles of ivory surely that will inflate the market price for ivory and put even more pressure on poaching?"

I have written a short story with some links to a web site or two here:

The Burning of Ivory

My advice on this issue of burning blood ivory can be answered by the Law of Supply and Demand. If we increase supply we increase demand only where the demand is so high that the supply can never exceed demand. This is the case in China as the middle class is getting wealthy day by day as their economy grows.

1.2 billion Chinese represents a mighty demand centre.

So we need to stop the supply completely and to do this several things have to happen:

- 1. ALL stock piles must be destroyed
- 2. Trade in ivory must be banned in every country in the world no matter how old or how new that ivory is.
- 3. The 35 ivory carving factories in China must be closed.
- 4. Heavy sentences for any breaches at those getting the ivory to market for the end user. That is poachers, middle men, the carvers and the outlets, the shops.
- 5. Every country that have elephants can without too much trouble close down the poachers. In the case of Kenya all President Uhuru Kenyatta has to do is to declare the elephant and rhino a National Treasure. Then defend them with the army and the armed rangers from the Kenya Wildlife Service.

In the short term arresting and imprisoning poachers can have a slow down effect. Reeducating them and training them to be rangers does work.

I am against shooting poachers as for every one that drops 10 more will take their place.

Easy? I don't think so.

Anyhow my thoughts only; once again welcome to all of our new members we are now 126 in number.
