SEARGENT AT ARMS:

Graeme Callander started by fining all accountants due to David Friedlieb's absence for the evening, then it was basically anyone who has anything to do with numbers or money. Graeme also enlightened us on marriage and grandchild issues that many of us are either used to or are looking forward to at some stage in the future.

<u>GUEST SPEAKER:</u> Peter Chenoweth introduced our guest speaker, John Smith, an apiarist from the local area. John gave an extremely informative presentation about the life of a Queen Bee and the social structure of a bee colony. A colony or a hive of bees consists of:

1 Queen Bee.

200 drone male bees, &

Around 50,000 worker bees (female, of course!)

All bees in a colony have their own jobs to do, whether it be nectar and pollen gathering, cleaning, food storage or mating with the queen. The colony will work quite harmoniously for up to 2 years until the colony or hive starts to become inbred due to the lack of genetic diversity created by a colony only having 1 breeding queen bee. A queen bee will mate with the male drones and lay up to 4000 eggs per day. When a hive or colony becomes overcrowded the queen will leave the hive and take up to half of the population with her to create a new colony somewhere else. A new queen will take the place of the original queen and continue to keep the colony active and viable.

John had brought a bee hive with him and transport boxes containing a queen bee. John explained that Australian bees are in high demand overseas and are exported to Europe and America. This is due to Australia being free of diseases that are prevalent in those parts of the world. Another reason for the popularity of Australian bees is that their working capacity is considerably greater than their native counterparts.

John advised that approximately 85% of the world's food crops are pollinated by honey bees. If bees were suddenly unavailable to do this job the world food production could decrease by as much as 40%. Crops such as canola, melons, almonds, apples and cereals require bees for pollination as their flower structure is not suitable for wind pollination alone.



Don Pembleton gave a vote of thanks to John for what was an extremely informative and interesting discussion on the life of a bee colony and presented John with our certificate of appreciation for his efforts.
