GUEST SPEAKER: Thara Pech did such a good job at the Dinner that Ruth recruited her on Tuesday to front up to the Club with a snapshot of her Journey through Life. She harked back 30 years when she started a small business in Singapore baking cakes with help from her parents. Her family migrated to Australia in 2006 and she enrolled at a Christian College where they initially would only enrol her for a Diploma Course as they thought that she would not be able to cope with a Degree. She upgraded to the Degree Course in 2007. In 2008 she met Keith and this slowed her down, she continued part-time to 2010 & reverted to fulltime in 2011 - Wagga Rotary helped by providing her with screen reading equipment which allowed her to get information without constant help. In 2012 she graduated with a Bachelor in Ministry, Majoring in Pastoral Management.



Thara joined the Ministry of her Church where her duties include guiding people

through their traumas and aiding in Relationship Reconciliation, the art of listening to people is an essential step towards assisting in healing. She is also a Board Member of Disability Advocate Network and joined our Club this year. She has been successful in gaining an Enterprise Incentive Scheme with an allowance paid for 12 months to

study for Certificate 4 in Management - there were 70 applicants for 14 grants.



Thara suffers from Retinitis Pigmentosa: this is a hereditary disease and current treatment can slow down but not cure the gradual deterioration in eyesight. She has been legally blind for the past 7 years & lives in a world of grey, white & black & occasionally a shade of red, orange or pink. Thara emphasised that it was essential that parents take children for vision tests as she didn't even know that she had vision impairment as a child.

Peter Chenoweth thanked Thara for her inspirational example; her spirit, determination & grace has not only survived but prevailed. He thanked Thara for joining our Club & enhancing our lives.

Ravindran is choice for 2015-16 RI president

K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran, a member of the Rotary Club of Colombo, Western Province, Sri Lanka, has been selected by the Nominating Committee for President of RI in 2015-16. Ravindran will become the president-nominee on 1 October if there are no challenging candidates.

Ravindran said his top priority for Rotary will be to increase membership, which he called the bedrock of any organization. "The emphasis on membership has to continue with focus on the younger generation," Ravindran said. "Additionally, we must seek to attract the just retired and experienced people into Rotary."

Creating regional membership plans and realizing that "one size does not fit all" has been a move in the right direction, he said. "Albert Einstein defined insanity as 'doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results.' In many ways this has been the story of Rotary's poor membership advance," he said. "Thankfully, our approach this time has been studied and altered. We have created 22 different membership regions so that each region would develop and execute a plan that would suit that particular region."

A Rotarian since 1974, Ravindran has served Rotary as a director and treasurer of RI and as a trustee of The Rotary Foundation. He has also served as an International Assembly group discussion leader, district governor, Council on Legislation representative, and zone institute chair. He chaired the Schools Reawakening project, sponsored by Rotary clubs and districts in Sri Lanka, which rebuilt 25 tsunami-devastated schools, benefiting 15,000 children.
