Guest Speaker: John Studdert introduced his onetime footy sideline mate, Bruce Duffy, from the Rotary Club of South Wagga.

Bruce spoke about his long involvement with Rotary in Nepal and a project to construct the Sindhuli Rural Studies College, which is happening in stages, including planning and design, between 2010 and 2015. The project is locally sponsored by the Rotary Club of Kathmandu. Bruce also presented President Daya and the Club with a scarf and banner from Kathmandu.



Nepal is a poor Himalayan country of 20 million, squeezed between India and China, with rugged terrain. Access is difficult; the main road from Kathmandu to Sindhuli takes 8 hours to drive 130km.

The Nepalese rely on subsistence agriculture which features terraced hillsides and a monsoonal climate. The objective of the College is to provide short courses to lift the skills of Nepalese farmers and in turn to improve the overall standard of living.

Politics in Nepal is a little shambolic and planning processes are a little different from ours. There is some local funding being provided, by a local heart specialist who has a large involvement with the project and from several different political parties.

A rare parcel of relatively flat land has been made available and building works will commence later this year. Bruce is seeking additional Rotary funding.

There were numerous questions asked of Bruce. Our thanks were extended to Bruce by Past President Barry Francis.
