
Mike invited me to check out the website via Google to verify the discovery via "Rotary Club of Dubrovnik"; & of course, as usual, Mike is a paragon of truthfulness, even if the discovery conveniently enabled him to sidestep his stated intention to avoid the British Isles.

Sergeant at Arms: Our Sergeant was Bryan Short who started off with a tale of a husband who promised to make his wife the happiest woman in the world whereupon she replied 'I'll miss you". Another confronted his wife "what have you been doing with all the housekeeping money" — "look in the mirror & turn sideways".

Enthusiasm is like a fire in a fireplace it needs an occasional poke with a stick and a clear conscience is a sign of a bad memory.

Guest Speaker: Our proposed guest speaker, Daya Govender, was unable to attend owing to the need to supervise a run of Pharmaceutical manufacturing. Gerry Page introduced the replacement, none other than Barry Francis who is renowned for his busking efforts raising substantial funds for charities & a tireless officer of the Club. Barry shared with us something close to his heart, a much loved child who suffered from psychological problems resulting in behaviour, drug & alcohol complications. These difficulties continued through school, where little help was offered, to adulthood & a succession of refuges until a Salvation Army Refuge in Sydney proved successful. A change of location was advised to break off contacts which would re-introduce the problems. This has been successful to date & a steady & responsible job & life has been achieved. Barry advises that one of the parental attributes required is "tough love", never give up or stop loving but be firm. Lots of mental illnesses have similar symptoms and the person must get to the stage that they acknowledge that they are doing themselves harm & want to change for the better. Barry stated that he found that he needed to inform friends of the traumas & discuss it to maintain his own sanity.

David Payne thanked Barry for sharing his experiences with us and commented that it must have been very hard to speak of what must have been a journey to hell & back over the period. David stated that we are proud to have Barry as our President.
