SHOW AND TELL: Graham Russell brought along some Indigenous artefacts that had been given to him by his father. Graham's dad had been driving a supply truck near Darwin during the war when he came across an elderly Indigenous Man sitting on the side of the road. He had no English but the two men were able to communicate and as a result Graham's dad was traded a stone knife with the handle made of gum together with a paper bark scabbard. He was also traded a killer boomerang with traditional markings made by stone tools. These legitimate artefacts made by ancient man were passed around. Graham is very proud of these artefacts as they are a link to his father and also to 40,000 years of Indigenous Culture in our land.



<u>SERGEANT AT ARMS:</u> Mary Ann Kelly very ably boosted our coffers with her fine session. She managed to fine every person in the room at least twice with her little snippets of trivia. Some examples of the trivia are:

GUEST SPEAKER: Our Guest Speaker, Chantelle Montgomery, was introduced by Ruth Barber.

Chantelle has just returned from her trip Kansas, USA, as a member of the GSE Team. She apologised for her lack of photos but said that they would be available at the full presentation at the District Conference in Leeton from the 19th to 21st April next year.

One of the many highlights of her trip was the discovery of a charity organisation called Numana Foods. This organisation sends food to third world countries and to victims of disaster. They purchase the food from local farmers and it is then packed, processed and sent directly to those in need.

In Eldorado she visited a High School which cost a total of \$9,000,000 and was paid for by the community. At one of the high schools they visited they were amazed that during a "lock down" trial 500 students disappeared in ten seconds!

In her own vocational area Chantelle told us that there is a bank on every corner and Drive By Banking is available. Chantelle spent time in banking in all the towns she visited.

She also told us that guns did not have to be registered. If you had a driver's licence you could buy a gun. Every vehicle has a gun in the glove box.

She also told us that Rotary is known everywhere and that the clubs are very good at recruiting young people. There are many young members between the ages of 30 and 40 in clubs.

When asked what her absolute highlight was she replied, "The people I met".

Chantelle was thanked by Rob Sharkie and presented with a certificate to immunise 10 children against polio.

The Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.
