GUEST SPEAKER:.

Hendrick van leperen, formerly a Rotarian from the Caribbean club St Martin Sunrise, spoke to us regarding his life changing decision to leave the balmy Caribbean island of St Martin to accept a job in far off Wagga Wagga. Our photo shows him in April this year when he visited Wagga for an interview with Wagga City Council, where he is now Strategic Transport Planner, arriving in August. He told us Columbus 'found' St. Martin in 1493 and it has had various owners since then — Dutch, Spanish, French. Formerly Netherlands Antilles it is now independent, with 40,000 population, 34 sq. km. In area; sharing the island with the French.



It is a very popular cruise destination, with up to six ships of around 4000 passengers there at a time. Its famous airport has huge jumbo's screaming low over the beach as they land. There are many casinos. The Carnival extending over weeks is spectacular and a major boat regatta is staged. St. Martin has four Rotary clubs and Hendrick gave us an insight into the projects undertaken by his former club: providing furniture for disadvantaged schools, a Readers are Leaders program, Vaccination Week, benefit concerts etc. Neil Hilpern gave the vote of thanks.

ROTARY'S WHEEL EMBLEM



A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement." Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus, in 1923, the present gear wheel, with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the "Rotary International Association." A group of engineers advised that the geared wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem. http://www.icufr.org/abc/abc01.htm
