SERGEANT AT ARMS: Neil Hilpern took this opportunity to first of all remind Members of the coming Saturday's Book sort & kicked off the session by fining all those who could not attend.

Neil went on to advise that The Wagga Show will be celebrating its 150th Year. The Showground is one of only 3 in NSW which is privately owned and was purchased by the then Murrumbidgee Pastoral Association. An effort is being made to mark this occasion with an exceptional Show & Rt. Alan Lean has come aboard with the Show Society Committee to help achieve this aim. Beef cattle have not been shown for a few years & this Section is to be revived with an aim to fill the Cattle Sheds again. All members with connections with Cattle are asked to pass on contact names. All members who did not attend the Show in 2013 were fined & all those who did not intend to attend this year's Show were also fined.

SHORT & SWEET Barry Francis claims to have been inspired by all Club Members but then became more credible when he claimed inspiration from Singers, Song Writers & Authors; Mothers, particularly his own, who taught him practical skills such as gutting fish, preparing & cooking chooks from their chook yard. She influenced his outlook on life, instilling in him the view that there always someone in the world worse off than you are & if you can't say something nice about someone then don't say anything at all.

GUEST SPEAKER: Anne Lowe is the Director of Community Health & Access at TAFE. She taught a number of the member's children at St Michaels with John Egan. Anne explained that he Wagga Institute is one of 10 in the State and its qualifications are recognised across Australia & some overseas areas. There are 19 Campuses here in an area from Lake Cargelligo to Young & Tumut to Coomealla. There are 400 Programs on offer with 1300 Employees & 28 to 35,000 students each year. They are looking at overseas opportunities. 92% of Graduates either find employment or follow further training. Funding is gained from the State & also businesses & enterprises for specific courses.



Ann indicated that the community wants Vocational Skills from TAFE Graduates but is also looking for leaders, hence the focus of this club's Rotary Outstanding Student Leadership Award, which was awarded to Julie Perri this year.

Julie thanked the Club & TAFE for the Award. She completed a number of courses 20 years ago in Small Business & Marketing. She ran a Photography business with her husband and practised Art in her spare time. In 2005 she had a life changing event & commenced Holding Art Classes for children (including Varoon Sharma). She decided gain a qualification in Art & enrolled at TAFE with a CSU integrated Degree in Visual Arts. She has exhibited in a number of Art Exhibitions & sold 70 of her Works. Her first solo exhibition will be held in the E3 Art Space at the Wagga Gallery, later this year. Julie closed with the statement that we should never stop believing in ourselves & shouldn't wait, as she did, for a life changing event to spur us to follow our dream.

Anne & Julie were thanked by John Studdert & presented with certificates of polio vaccinations of 10 children.

ROTARY NEWS

A.H. Royce Abbey, a former RI president and World War II hero who championed the inclusion of women members in Rotary clubs, died on 20 February. He was 91. Abbey, who joined Rotary in 1954, was a member of the Rotary Club of Essendon, Victoria, Australia.

During his term as RI president, one of the most dramatic changes in Rotary's history occurred when the Council of Legislation changed the constitutional documents to allow women membership to Rotary clubs.



Abbey's commitment to community service was recognized by Queen Elizabeth II, who, on Australia Day in 1988, made him a Member of the Order of Australia. The next year he was chosen Victorian of the Year by the State of Victoria. Additionally, while serving in World War II, Abbey was awarded one of Australia's highest military honours, the Distinguished Conduct Medal for an act of heroism and leadership.

GREAT GOURMET EXPERIENCES OF THE PAST

NO. 3 - PET FOOD SURVEYS

That animals cannot speak, much less command a language, should not be taken to mean that there cannot be effective communications between them and us. Body language, body contact, tones of sound, and eye to eye contact can clearly convey a message. Signs of impatience are very graphic and if you have not received one from a cat it means one of two things viz:-

- You have been deemed to be too dense or insensitive to be communicated with and are consequently ignored, or
 - You are exceptionally attentive and have provided every need your companion desires.

A common cat signal, seen daily, takes the form of a swish of the tail, an accusing look and a few steps in the appropriate direction, meaning: "Get your a..e into gear and get my tea." Now before you become impatient and start swishing your proverbial tail, I'll return to the subject matter.

Unlike manufacturers of human products, who only work out that their product is deficient when it no longer sells, pet food manufacturers spend a lot of resources surveying their 'clients' to see that their products are still relevant. Knowing that their 'clients' are subject to supply by careless, uncaring or just plain stupid shoppers, it is important to encourage the long suffering animal to clearly indicate which product is superior and suitable for their tastes. In this regard, while dogs will generally eat anything, cats, like humans, desire variety and continuous servings of Dine sardines will not lead to your being crowned 'Pet Owner of the Year'

Pet food company surveys are concise and regular. Once an animal establishes a reputation for clear concise and fearless critique it is likely to remain a highly respected survey animal for years. The owner, of course, is needed for interpretive duties and is similarly appreciated by the company.

The survey, of course, depends on effective communication and, as with human surveys, the questions are directed from many angles aimed at overcoming human denseness, as the cat is not prone to deception or confusion.

Finally there is a line for the animal's direct comment, which in the case of a cat can evoke comments (clearly signalled to the interpreter), which might contain such messages as:-

- Mouth licking good. My compliments to the chef.
- Not bad, but not too often thanks.
- Bloody awful- Cease manufacturing immediately.
- How dare you feed me poison?

By contrast, I recently purchased a 'no name' fruit cake, which was a shoddy product. I wish I had a survey form and a cat to help me in wording the comment. LJF 7/2/14
