GUEST SPEAKER:

Dawn Smith introduced **President Denise Flockton** (needing no introduction) well-known as a traveller, and recently to Nepal from which experiences Denise would speak to us.

Denise said her Nepal trip took her outside of her comfort zone in many ways. Initiated by the Wahroonga Rotary Club, and working through the Rotary Australia World Community Service, the School Construction & Literacy Project, Gorkha district, Nepal, gathered Rotarians Mary Brell (Orange Daybreak), Richard Jackson and Anne Prescott (Wahroonga), Graham and Judy Tyson (Bathurst and Lithgow), as well as Denise. The aim was to train the teachers in different educational strategies other than rote-learning, even though the region was remote, without mains electricity, and without A/V resources. This forced the team to think hard about both fundamentals of education/teaching and to aim developmentally.

Denise illustrated her talk with dramatic, detailed and evocative slides, eg of the terrain, near Everest, with its valleys and hills, narrow, winding roads on which an accident delayed their initial journey out. They then had a 2-3 hr walk, climbing 1000 metres. From Arughat to Ratmate, they had to cross a gorge on a narrow suspension bridge and were welcomed at the other side by school students and the local band who had come to welcome the group and accompany them back to their village. Along the way there were welcome signs in English, such as 'We feel blessed to have people of such great stature serving to better our society' (Shankar Primary School). At the opening ceremony (3 hours duration) they were decorated

with red tikka marks and given a guard of honour by students. The one microphone was powered by a generator and passed from person to person, each having to speak for at least 15 minutes in Nepali (Denise assuaged their hunger with jelly beans from her pack.)

Their accommodation was bright yellow dome tents, pitched on a rice paddy (the stubble was uncomfortable). Food was supplied by a trekking company and included 'western' dishes such as pasta, cake, chips to supplement the rice and noodles. (Each member had brought two bottles of wine in their packs to the village.) Amenities: there was one flushing western toilet in the district – in the same 'room' as the shower. People became used to using two pitchers of water for each shower (Denise needed four for her hair). Because the area is in a small valley in the Himalayas, it wasn't so cold at night and the men would come out to play and sing. They were accepting of the women in the group, even though the village women did not join in.

Schools were very basic: wooden benches, mud walls, shutters (if you want light you had to have the cold too). Blackboards were painted concrete and toilet facilities were often forbidding (one 'long drop' toilet for 500 children was often a disincentive for girls to attend school). Similarly, staffroom facilities were cramped, with the principal's 'office' being the corner of a crowded room. While the government pays the salary for one teacher, the village had to pay for buildings, amenities etc and each school building cost around \$4000. Denise showed the first community library in the district. Children delighted in wearing their uniforms and ties.

Because the government had legislated that all education/instruction should be in English, the needs of remote places for interaction with native English speakers is critical and the teacher training program Denise was on focussed on expanding teaching skills and strategies, developing EFL programs and proposing further programs. On this trip, each member had his/her own translator. Denise used the money raised by students at WWHS to present a resources package to each school: dictionary (English-Nepali), atlas, word puzzles, blow-up globe etc.

Denise showed scenes of village life: the terraced paddies (one of the wonders of the man-made world, added Len Wade, later), the store/blacksmith, washing at a stream/spout, carrying goods and a still for making millet wine. As well, there were some picturesque panoramas of mountains and the moon, Mt Everest, a plank-cutter and a clinic.

Denise concluded by underlining the need for more teacher training groups and volunteers to help build and re-vamp buildings in villages, some of which are intending to build accommodation to house volunteers for such work.

David Gilbey thanked Denise for her detailed and illuminating presentation, which enabled us not only to know what she had done and where she had been, but to feel that there was a worthwhile contribution to world well-being that we too could make.
