

GUEST SPEAKER: Rick Priest, Wagga Wagga Men's Shed

Rick greeted Sunrise Rotary with a warm welcome.

The Men's Shed planning for our breakfast meeting had been going along quite well until Rick received a phone call last Sunday seeking assistance in North Wagga. The well-documented army (literally) of volunteers and residents involved in the clean-up operation would require feeding & watering. The Men's Shed rallied to the cause without hesitation. As a sign of the dedication of these blokes, they also rolled up to fulfil their prior commitment to the BBQ Breakfast for Sunrise Rotary. The land occupied by the Men's Shed was formerly home to the Pony Club. After the land became vacant, the Men's Shed re-visited the site three times before finally deciding to put down some roots. With the ever present issues of vandalism/break & enter etc, a secure fence was going to be a priority. An initial quote of \$140,000 was always going to be a big hurdle. As it transpired, the nearby Ashmont School was having its fencing replaced. Following a bit of negotiation, a deal was struck with the school fencing contractor. He was

already three days behind schedule. The Men's Shed rallied and removed the old school fencing in exchange for being able to 'keep it'. This is now the fence surrounding the Men's Shed grounds. As an aside, the fencing contractor finished his job five days ahead of schedule. In appreciation, the fencing contractor also made a donation of \$500 to the Men's Shed.

Rick highlighted two examples of the 'void' that the Shed can fulfil in the community. These 'Lone Rangers' as Rick described them, lived alone and had little or no contact with family. The first had left a will which was found among his belongings and a final request was that he be finally laid to rest at 'Sue City'. With no local family and Sue City being some distance away, the ashes currently reside in a safe within the Men's Shed until such time as they can be transported to Sue City and a final resting place.

(If like the writer, some of you were wondering where in this great land is Sue City, I thank Google yet again. I stand to be corrected but my limited research suggests the Cabramurra, Talbingo, Tumbarumba & Adaminaby regions will be somewhere close.)

The second chap was the victim of a road accident on Kooringal Road and he is still recovering in hospital in Sydney. With Police involvement, contact was finally made with this person's 36 year old daughter. She had not seen her father for eleven years. As a sign of the gratitude that this man's family has placed on his involvement with the Men's Shed, Rick has thus far received 54 sms giving an update on the victim's recovery progress. Many wives have commented that since joining the Men's Shed, their husband/partner of old has come back. These men have found something to occupy their time and they return to their homes in a much happier frame of mind as distinct from moping around the house. Peace reigns at home.

In June 2011, the men lost their main shed to a fire. That building was their meeting room, kitchen and computer room. The day following the fire, they received two demountables which they have

fashioned into a very workable solution until the destroyed facility can be replaced. Fortunately, the shed was insured.

From the outside, the yard and surrounds resemble an old 'junk yard'. All the materials however

will at some stage be put to good use. Nothing is new with 2nd, 3rd & 4th hand items all the rage. The members were recently offered the opportunity to 'raid' the old 'Red Lion Hotel' which is on the demolition list. Among other items, the members retrieved \$1,700 worth of copper tubing. Garden beds produce many and varied fresh produce for the members.

A little from left field but the association proudly boasts ten bee hives. Some of the local honey was enjoyed by Sunrise members as they downed their morning serve of oats.



There is pretty much no restriction on what members can undertake in the association provided it is legal. Metalwork, woodwork abound. Sunrise member, John Wood (pic, left, with Val Samuelson and Tim Stait's right shoulder) received special mention having been the generous donor of various wood working machines and equipment, surplus to his own business needs. Brewing has also been added to the activity with the proviso it is not sold and is only for personal consumption. Whilst

willing and able to assist many in need, members will not undertake any work which would compete with someone's trade or work.

It is a Men's Shed however in these time of 'equal rights', and Rick did relay the story of a particularly persistent woman who seemed determined to join this last bastion of male-only organisations. After many attempts the woman was finally 'persuaded' that she was not eligible to join as she would undoubtedly fail the final medical parade test of being able to prove her manhood.
