Announcements: Tonya Davis, rep from the Be the Match national marrow donor program, was grateful for our recent addition of 32 potential life-savers. With our October round-up of prospects, the club celebrated 15 years in the program.

Davis noted that where the previous age range for enlistees was 18 to 60 years, next year it will be 18-44. Research has proven that folks within those ages provide a significantly higher success rate for marrow transfer.

The registry process has been simplified considerably. A mere cheek swab renders the necessary DNA from a would-be donor. Ten percent of registrants are contacted as potential donors. A simple blood test follows to further refine donor matches. Today, one in 549 on the national registry is

called to donate. Which, by the way, involves no more than a painless IV, during which stem cells are pulled from the blood, then blood returned to the body.
