

Presentation: The club is particularly grateful to this meeting's presenter, our own Thom Sivo, for his stepping up to the plate with less than a full day's notice. The originally scheduled speaker could not make it, and Thom admirably provided a very well done, informative, and interesting session on the work and advancements happening at the Hospice for the Western Reserve.

Thom serves in the Community Relations area for this local Hospice and his experience and skill and passion for the entity was evident throughout what he shared with our Club membership. His background as a professional photographer made the presentation, and its simultaneous slide show, all the more unique and interesting for us.

One of the first awarenessbuilding messages we heard was that it's a misconception to believe that hospice care is unified nationwide. The for-profit institutions have grown in numbers in recent years, and these may employ alternative philosophies and practices than the not-for-profits that have been engaged in providing care and services for decades. There are about 4,700 hospices, offering care for more than 1.4 million patients. In northeast Ohio (which includes counties from Lorain to the west, the Pennsylvania border to the east, and Summit County to the south) there are currently 1,200 patients in hospice, and 600 patients in what is known as the Navigator Program.

The concept of hospice was first invented by Dr. Sanders in London in 1966. "Hospice" is the Latin version of "hospitality." Dr. Sanders brought the concept of hospice care to the United States in 1974 in the community of New Haven, Connecticut. The first hospice of northeast Ohio, The Hospice for the Western Reserve, was born 34 years ago. At that time there were a handful of people taking care of cancer patients. Today there are approximately 1, 000 staff members and 1,800 volunteers caring for people suffering with any type of life-limiting disease. There are about 50 hospice organizations in Northeast Ohio.

"Hospice" is not a place or facility, but a way of thinking, including holistic care and pain management. The concept is dedicated to allowing one's life to be lived to the fullest within the diagnosis of having a life-limiting disease.

The free-standing hospice center, David Simpson Hospice House, overlooks Lake Erie at the northernmost end of East 185<sup>th</sup> Street in Cleveland. Mr. Sivo encouraged us to stop by the House, especially to walk through the gardens and a get a feel for the beauty and peacefulness inspired by the location and its facilities. The Ames Family Hospice House opened up in

Westlake just this past July. You'll find it at Crocker Bassett, but the landscape architecture gently tucks it away from stark street view. There too is a pond and garden and state of the art facility. The building itself is as close to being 100% "green" as you can get. Patients and their families can use advanced technology to visit with someone in another part of the world through "skype-like" communications and flat screens displaying all parties present for the conversation and visit.

Thom featured a few of the programs offered through Hospice for the Western Reserve. "A Meal to Remember" was the brainchild of the recently new CEO, Bill Finn. Patients and their families gather together to enjoy sumptuous gourmet feasts created by renowned chefs from some of the premier eateries in the area. "Expressive Therapies" bring art and music into the patients lives in uplifting ways. A team of qualified art and music therapists learn about patients needs and wishes in a variety of caring ways and fill those needs and act on what is important to patients. "Peaceful and Proud" is a national initiative for Hospice to recognize the needs of veterans and honor their service in ways that are particularly meaningful to those men and women vets. "Life Enrichment" is one program that sets the Hospice for the Western Reserve apart. It's their version of the "Make-A-Wish" program. A patient might simply make a comment to a care-giver or volunteer and once the wish or hope or desire is shared, the staff goes all out to fulfill it. An opening season Brown's game came to fruition with all the trimmings for one patient; a trip to the Horseshoe Casino was made possible for another; a specifically designed Classic Car Show came to being for another patient, complete with his own classic car on display; and renewal of marriage vows to include a photographer (absent the first time around.) With over 2,800 staff members and volunteers, there are so many excellent connections to people of influence in the northeast Ohio community, there doesn't seem to be very many wishes that won't get fulfilled.

The Hospice of the Western Reserve has a "sister" institution in South Africa, giving the two hospices the opportunity to share best practices and information. Thom had the pleasure of traveling to South Africa in one of his very first assignments as a member of the Western Reserve staff. He photographed the coming together of the organizations, to include recording the vesting in the South African parliament.

Thom concluded by sharing some thought-provoking statistics. People who go into hospice care tend to live 30 days longer than someone who does not. Further, he noted that the receipt of Medicare funding requires a spiritual component be offered to the hospice patient. It can be declined, but the offering has to be there. This and every other decision is completely up to the patient and his and her family. In addition, the Hospice of the Western Reserve is one of the only hospices with a dedicated pediatric team to specifically meet the needs of children.
