

Program: The program, titled "The Toonalution of Big Business" was presented by Greg Stanley, cartoonist and business consultant. The definition of toonalution, a word he made up, is the evolution from a realistic complex form to a simplistic cartoon form.

Using a Dilbert type cartoon character, Stanley has written a book that shows how everyday events will mirror proven business practices that will equip one for a successful career. The book contains eleven real world examples, applicable lessons and quirky characters to help one understand ways to succeed at any point in your career.

His presentation used Toonalution number six, which is self assessing one's performance path by increasing the asset value of an employee. He asked "are you a positive or a negative asset" to your employer?

Stanley went on to compare the road to success as a road under con-

struction. Employees are similar to transportation infrastructure, as both are fraught with shortcomings and weaknesses in need of extensive improvements.
