At the District Conference, Past Pres. Mike Scruggs gave President Wayne a token, with the Rotary Wheel on one side and the 4-Way Test on the reverse. This token is designed to be passed on to people in the club that the donor believes deserve recognition for service to the club. Each recipient is to retain the token until he or she finds another deserving member and passes it on to that member at a club meeting.

Speaker: It's a sure bet that many did not know the ins and the outs of high stakes poker. We learned about what goes on in a "big time poker game" and more from Waite Talbot, Poker Master.

He began playing as a child. While on vacation as an adult in Las Vegas, he found himself with some time on his hands and went to see the World Series of Poker at the Rio. Throwing over golf for poker, Waite decided to become as good as he could be.

He went to "Poker School" for four days at Caesars Palace. He met Ray Romano as well as lots of poker professionals at the poker school. To be a good poker player you have to know some math and what beats what. To be a great poker player you have to have a great deal more knowledge of people and their reactions.

He spoke of "TELLS". Tells are those human reactions that you just simply can't control. They happen. People naturally like to look at things they like and do not look at things they do not like. That is the reason that many players wear sun glasses, hats, hoods etc.

A "Hollywood" occurs when you look away quickly. He asked us to look at our feet. Apparently, they are very telling. If both feet are pointed at you when you are talking to another person, they are interested in you and what you are saying. If one foot is pointed to the side, it indicates that the person is ready to exit.

If when talking to a woman, (men that is) and she has her legs crossed that is a good sign. If the foot is bouncing that is even better. There is really "no telling" what Elfie's crossed foot meant as it was bouncing towards Roger. They were right next to this writer and it couldn't be missed.

These automatic reactions usually can't be prevented and these high level poker players try to see these reactions as they play. The "Poker Tell" separates the kitchen poker game from the casino game.

A question was asked about what successful "reads" Waite has. He recounted (no pun intended) a time when he read the player next to him as he got

his cards and was able to ante enough to get him to fold. He said a good rule of thumb is not to look at your cards until it is time to make you play so that your expression does not reveal anything. He could tell that the person next to him had nothing interesting by how he reacted when he looked at his cards.

Elfie asked about math ability and card counting and if it was illegal. Surprisingly, counting cards is not illegal but casinos invite you in to play and they can ask you to leave and not come back if you are counting cards. In blackjack, the casino loses every time the dealer loses. In poker, the casino makes money on every play.

What money does it take to get into a big game? At the World Series of Poker a big winner can walk away with between \$8 and \$10 million dollars. The top 20% in the game will win \$20,000 and up. You can get into a game for \$30-\$40 and build your money up. The pros show up with about \$10,000 to play. There is often \$1 million in cash - \$100 dollar bills bundled up into \$50,000 bricks. Those are thrown around the table.

Can a player pretend his reaction? The "Hollywood" is not as easy as one would think. Waite played with Shane last evening and he thinks that Shane believed his "Hollywood" as he bet \$25,000 (in poker chips not money) and Shane folded. There was a whole explanation of flops and rivers.

Poor poker players play the cards that they hold in their hand. Great card players play any 2 cards and a handful of chips!

Thanks for a great and interesting presentation. I guess it is true... "You have to know when to hold 'em, know when to fold 'em, know when to walk away, know when to run!"

President Wayne reminded us that we can still donate to the United Way food drive at the old Ethan Allen store at the mall on Saturday until 4:00 p.m.

The meeting was adjourned.
