

Nutrition and Health Care, Education and environmental stewardship in local communities are some of their causes. They have built a school in China for the children of the workers.

GUEST SPEAKER - ROD BOWMAN INTRODUCED DONNA CAVANAGH OUR GUEST SPEAKER FOR CANASSIST.

Donna has been in Wagga since January. She is the President of Can Assist in Wagga. It stated 57 years ago in Sydney. Can Assist was established in 1955 by Mrs Mona Ham, a trained nurse who recognised the lack of support services specifically designed to assist rural cancer patients and their families. Mona worked tirelessly and in 1961 the Jean Colvin Hospital opened, later to be known as the Jean Colvin Cancer Centre. Today Can Assist continues to provide accommodation to country families with cancer through the Sydney Accommodation Service and Lilier Lodge in Wagga Wagga. There are 49 branches and over 2000 volunteers. The first branch was Forbes in 1958The Wagga branch formed in 1979. Country people are 35 percent more likely to die than city patients but higher if you live over 100ks away from treatment. Farmers do not have the time to take the treatment, and often give up hope and treatment. The vision of Can Assist is equity of access to all. Can Assist helps with transport costs, accommodation, and bills and will prioritise according to needs. Mona originally had 2 staff, now has 5 paid staff. The rest are
