

<u>International Toast:</u> JOHN RORRISON - Tonight's International Toast is to **The Rotary Club of Cambridge**, **Massachusetts**, **USA**.

Cambridge is a city in Middlesex county Massachusetts, situated directly north of Boston across the Charles river. It was named in honor of the University of Cambridge England. Cambridge is home to two of the worlds most prominent Universities in the world, Harvard University and The Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the City has a population of 160,000.

In 1636 Harvard College was founded by the colony to train ministers. The first President and first Benefactor (John Harvard) and first schoolmaster of Harvard were all Cambridge Alumni as was the First Governor of the Massachusetts Bay Colony (John Winthrop). In the middle of the 19th century there was a literary revolution and Cambridge was home to Henry Wordsworth Longfellow, James Russell Lowell and Oliver Wendell Holmes who were as popular as Rock stars are today.

The Cambridge Rotary Club was founded in 1922, has 56 members and meets at 12.30 on Thursdays upstairs on the square at 91Winthrop street. The President is Randolf C Lindel and the secretary is Louise Olsen.

GUEST SPEAKER - LAURIE MYERS INTRODUCED JOHN CLOUT OUR GUEST SPEAKER FOR KIDNEY HEALTH.

John is involved with Kidney Health. He was originally from Tumut, John works at Riverina TAFE. He visited his GP and a blood test indicated that his kidneys were failing. He had to have dialysis just before he was given his kidney transplant in 2009, his donor was his wife. She was a one in six match to John. It normally takes 12 weeks to get fit again and go home after a transplant, but John was home in 10 weeks. In 2010 he was invited to go in a kidney car rally. In 2011 he decided to put his own car in the Rally. SWWRC donated to sponsor his car. He asked us to imagine our life so far, then imagine if every week we spent 3 days a week on dialysis, and only 4 days doing what we need to do. Then imaging if we were child in that condition.

The last Rally went from Mandura WA to Bendigo via Kalgoorlie, and the funds go to kids with kidney problems. Rally's are fun, there are over 60 cars in the rally. It takes \$4,500 to go in the off road rally, on road cars cost \$2500. Sleeping most of the time in swags, otherwise participants pay for their own accommodation, meals covered by the entry fee. Ladies go too but have time to go shopping. Timed event, average speeds, go by the clock. There are 3-4 kids in Wagga on the donor program. John would like another sponsorship from the club, but was so grateful for our last sponsorship, he presented the club with a wonderful thank you gift and left us with very important brochures and information about kidney health and indicators of kidney disorders.
