ASHLEY KAIMOWITZ – Youth Leader of the Month

As you know, we are linked with Nonceba and the Ashley Kaimowitz Award Scheme. This is through our association with Ashley as our sponsored exchange student to Japan, her dedication at the age of 16 to Nonceba, her production of a video of the crisis of raped and abused children at that time and the fulfilment of the building of a centre in her name in Kayelitsha. Killed by a drunk driver at the age of only 19 her dream lives on through her parents and the Board of the Nonceba organisation. Not least of all because of Don Peters who has always championed this cause and who is our Foundation member and really the "father" of our club.

If any of us have not visited Nonceba [and I hope that there are few] please contact Don to do so, and see what has been achieved. This is a magnificent building but what goes on behind the protective structure is what matters. The green grass and play centre are the tranquillity and protection encircling the counselling and crisis management.

LITTLE ANGELS and GRCT [GARDEN ROUTE CHILDRENS'TRUST]

As mentioned previously, Little Angels will be the subject of a separate newsletter dedicated to this project which is fast taking on a dimension of its own. I have already detailed some of the initiatives in place including Breadline Africa and Oceana for containers set up as classroom, toilet and kitchen respectively. Our own feeding scheme and other sources of income as well as the needs. I need also to mention the input of Totnes Devon RC for their donations and support as well as GRCT [Garden Route Children's Trust] in the UK which has selected not only Little Angels but two other crèches in the district for help with E pap. These are Siyazama and Noluthando pre-schools which will benefit fromt the Epap program which GRCT operate.

Liz Huckle, myself and Ria Gibb are working closely with this organisation and have taken delivery of the Epap required and paid for. I have yet to visit the Siyazama and Noluthandu pre-schools but am planning to do so with Ria as soon as she is back from the UK.

I believe that the GRCT initiative comes through Keith Bull at Totnes Devon RC. Such great help and great work. To get the message across and to tap in to the people who really DO want to make a difference.

Joelle has been working rather hard in my absence, notably heading up the drive for panties and socks for Little Angels. With Butch's persistence a total of 148 undies and 63 pairs of socks were purchased and there is money left over. All this from a comment from Liezel Matthews made to me that many, if not most of the kids didn't have undies which was distressing to them. As many of the clothes Bernadette had collected were for girls, some of the boys were wearing pink panties. Not good for the image whatever age you are! Then Randy [Liezel's right hand lady] mentioned that socks were also absent for most of the little ones. She wasn't expecting but just hoping that we might help. Well, there goes Butch and Joelle again. Off on another drive. Even our ADG Jackie James brought along packets of socks and panties at last Tuesday's meeting. Word gets around! Joelle took the collection to Little Angels and the photos are below.

Not content with this, Joelle organised a Quiz night at the LookOut Deck last Wednesday in support of Little Angels. She raised R3,000 to go toward their feeding program. AND Joelle is putting together a recipe book [with our individual submissions] which we can all buy [and sell] to raise funds for Little Angels.

See, it can be done.

Joelle is also working with ABC to fix our leaking roof and deal with other issues. She really is a club champion.





Tragedy struck as one duck managed to streak ahead of all the rest, picking the centre current of the river – however, within 20 metres of the finish line it was attacked by two aggressive seagulls, turning it over. Luckily those creeping up the inside were becalmed around the abutments of the bridge, and justice was done! Crowds turned out for the event, with entertainment and refreshments provided at the finish line. The banks of the river were teeming with people on the hottest day of the year! Some R30,000 was raised for Rotary charities.
